Each room in the museum has a different theme for visitors to learn about the culture and the people who have created and sustained this mountain community. 


First established in 1808 from Buncombe County, Haywood County was named for John Haywood, the North Carolina Treasurer from 1787 to 1827. Originally, Haywood County encompassed all the lands west of Buncombe County to Tennessee, with the exception of the Indian Territories. Haywood remained the western most county until 1828 when Macon County was formed.
